Point of care ultrasound (POCUS) has emerged as a valuable diagnostic tool in triage and management of patients. Ultrasound is repeatable and does not use ionizing radiation like X-ray and CT, which is of particular advantage in paediatric patients.

The introduction of affordable, portable, durable, high quality ultrasound units had lead non radiologists performing limited ultrasound scans at a patient's bed side, in the emergency room or ward setting to facilitate rapid diagnosis and guide clinical decision making and is a promising tool for resource limited settings.
